Our local chapter is dedicated to serving the Buffalo community at large, as well as aiding in the advancement of underrepresented minority students in the field of dentistry. SNDA's mission is to: Educate members about the social, moral, and ethical obligations of the dental profession, provide dental care and education with an emphasis on addressing access to care issues and health disparities, serve as a forum and network for dental students and provide mentorship to pre-dental students. As chapter president my role is to keep my members motivated with our goals in mind, serve as leader as well as a mentor and bridge our Buffalo chapter with SNDA on a national level. As an African-American female being the president of SNDA has been a huge honor for me from a personal as well as a historical standpoint.

My favorite thing about UB is that it is a supportive environment - from students to administration. I have felt the same way since interview day. I feel like there is always someone to talk to, always someone who cares and always someone there to have your back.

- Best practices to improve cultural competence and support LGBTQ students.

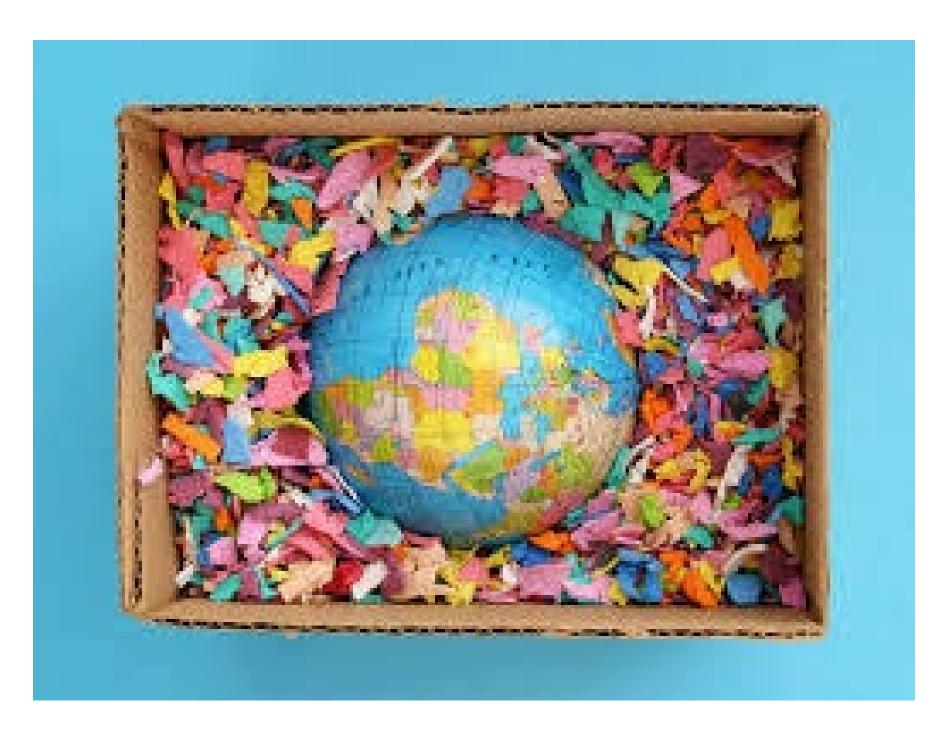
